Sermon Notes

Titus 1:10-13
"Be Sound in the Faith"
A Sermon Series on Titus
February 25, 2024

Introduction

- 1) C.S. Lewis in his great book <u>The Screwtape Letters</u> gives a wonderful piece of sanctification advice for the church and Christians.
 - a) He argues one of the "greatest" tricks of the devil is to keep us focused on the exact opposite problem that we are in danger of becoming.
 - b) For example, in a very zealous fundamentalist legalistic age, we are terrified of becoming too liberal when actually a bit more focus on charity would be helpful.
 - c) Or, in a very liberal tolerant permissive age we are terrified of becoming too puritanical (which is actually good word, to illustrate the problem) when a bit more focus on holiness and the fear of the Lord would be helpful.
 - d) Both are actually caving in to the world around them and both are being legalistic, however, more about that later, though keep this axiom in your mind.
- 2) Last week we heard how important doctrine is to the church.
 - a) We are going through the Book of Titus, one of the Pastoral Epistles (i.e. 1 & 2Timothy, Titus) where Paul instructs pastors on how to govern the church.
 - b) Here, Paul commands Titus to appoint elders in churches on the Island of Crete. Titus 1:1-5
 - c) The main qualification of those who lead the church is to hold "fast the faithful word which is in accordance with the teaching, so that he will be able both to exhort in sound doctrine and to refute those who contradict." Titus 1:9
- 3) There is a faction (or factions?) within the church which are causing much trouble. They are:
 - a) "rebellious men" Titus 1:10
 - b) "empty talkers" Titus 1:10
 - c) "deceivers" Titus 1:10
 - d) "upsetting whole families" Titus 1:11
 - e) "teaching things they should not teach for the sake of sordid gain" Titus 1:11-12
 - f) "liars, evil beasts, lazy gluttons" Titus 1:12
- 4) These heretics, Paul commands pastor Titus and the elders, "must be silenced" Titus 1:11 The leadership is to "reprove them severely" Titus 1:13
- 5) This is a serious problem.
 - a) These heretics are not Christians asking questions like good Bereans.

Acts 17:11

b) Nor are they new Christians, or some simple meek believer, who should receive much charity.

Ex 22:22-24; Is 42:3; Matt 9:13; 11:29-30; Luke 10:41-42; John 8:7

About Heresy & Heretics

- 1) Let's define some terms:
 - a) **Orthodoxy**: Right, true, correct belief or opinion.
 - b) **Heresy**: Wrong, false, erroneous belief or opinion that especially is promoted.
- 2) For example,
 - a) The belief that Jesus Christ is fully God and fully man (i.e. the doctrine of the *hypostatic union*) is *orthodox*, i.e. correct.
 - b) The belief that Jesus did not have a real physical body, but only an illusory one, is the *heresy* of *Docetism*, a Gnostic belief.
- 3) Technically, a pagan, or unbeliever, cannot be a heretic.
 - a) To be a heretic you have to claim to be a Christian but believe something that is clearly against the orthodox (i.e. correct) Christian faith.
 - i) Note, the denomination "Eastern Orthodox", sometimes simply called "Orthodox" is different from simply being "orthodox" having correct doctrine.
 - ii) Just like "catholic church" means the "universal church" is different from the "Roman Catholic Church" which sometimes is simply called "Catholic."
 - b) Being a pagan or unbeliever is bad, however, a heretic is far more dangerous to the church.

Luke 12:46; 1Cor 5:12-13; 2Cor 6:14-15; 1Tim 5:8

- 4) Everyone actually believes in orthodoxy, heresy and disciplining heretics.
 - a) I use to think one of the problems with theological liberals, and mainstream Evangelicals, is that they don't practice church discipline.
 - b) After Covid, I realized I was wrong. They do.
 - i) Though they would reject any such "judgmental" terms as "heresy."
 - ii) They have no problem disciplining anyone who promotes evil the world thinks is also evil (e.g. racism) or correcting anyone that sins against worldly dogma (e.g. wearing masks or being against feminism). They also certainly train all in the church to agree with their dogmas, while saying they have no dogmas.
 - iii) Their problem is they do discipline but wrongly, based on a fear of the world, instead of a fear of God. They are using the language of "tolerance" to hide their heresies while appeasing the world, making them hypocrites.
 - c) The people who proclaim "tolerance" tend to be very dogmatic and intolerant.

How to Spot a Heretic! - Titus 1:10-13a

- 1) When you think of a heretic, a very evil person, what image comes to mind?
 - a) A Neo-Nazi? A member of the Clan? Someone with a handle-bar mustache and a black top hat?
 - i) A quick reading of Titus 1:10-12 might even encourage this.
 - ii) The heretics are "rebellious", "empty talkers", "deceivers", "upsetting whole families", "teaching things they should not teach for the sake of sordid gain".
 - b) Someone almost comically evil?

- 2) We all tend to do this: Making evil, so ridiculously evil, so we don't have to deal with it.
 - a) We make evil people like Hitler, or even Satan, so comic that it is easy to deal with them.
 - i) Imaging a fictitious guy in a red suit, horns and a plastic trident, is easy to ignore.
 - ii) Remembering that Satan disguises himself as an angel Gen 3:15; Job 1:12; of light, and he and his minions are engaged in an age 2Cor 2:11; 11:14; long battle against Christ church's requires solid doctrine, faith, courage, love and solid leadership. Eph 6:12; 1Pet 5:8; James 4:7; Rev 12:17
 - iii) If you claim to be a Christian and don't believe in Satan, I can assure you Satan is very pleased with you.
 - b) We lie to ourselves, as we like to think "of course I, and all my family and friends, would never have been a Nazi in WW2 Germany."
 - i) And, of course, "I alone would have courageously stood up to Hitler, even though all society would have been against me."
 - ii) No, no you wouldn't. The vast majority of us would have caved. Very few people are that brave.
- 3) That is why Paul is so insistent that trained, godly, faithful, courageous *men* are to lead the church.
 - a) As a generalization, men are better at putting truth over feelings.

 For example, they make better executioners.

 Deut 21:21
 - b) Also, there is courage in numbers. It is easier to be a pastor when Eccles 4:9-12 surrounded by godly men.
- 4) Many of the worst heretics throughout the history of the church were sincere people who really thought they were helping the church and in many cases had many admirable personality traits. (Think of Marcion, Pelagius, Schleiermacher, Finney, Osteen or Warren.)
- 5) Question, could someone be very soft-spoke, winsome, tolerant and be "rebellious", "empty talkers", "deceivers", "upsetting whole families", "teaching things they should not teach for the sake of sordid gain"?
 - a) Of course! And they would be even better at spreading their heresy.
 - b) Remember the words of the Lord Jesus, "Beware of the false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly are ravenous wolves. You will know them by their fruits. Grapes are not gathered from thorn bushes nor figs from thistles, are they? So every good tree bears good fruit, but the bad tree bears bad fruit." Matthew 7:15-17
 - i) And what is the good fruit? Orthodoxy! Correct doctrine.
 - ii) With that correct doctrine worked out in love as defined by God, not this world.

Gal 5:19-26

- 6) Though going on a (false) "witch hunt" can be a great sin, it is very common for heretics to complain about "witch hunts" when people start to question their doctrine.
- 7) This might be the reason Paul gets so aggressive, when he writes, "One of themselves, a prophet of their own, said, 'Cretans are always liars, evil beasts, lazy gluttons.' This testimony is true" Titus 1:12-13a
 - a) Paul is not being racist here. He is simply using one of their own to point out the danger of the heretics.¹

¹ Paul is quoting the famous Cretan philosopher Epimenides (c. 600 BC). Similar to a Jewish comedian telling jokes about Jewish habits. So, Paul half-jokingly agrees that their country's most famous writer accurately describes these false teachers as liars, beasts and lazy gluttons. Thus, Paul is not saying all Cretans are liars, just the bad ones. Obviously, the church was concerned that Crete hear the Gospel. (Acts 2:11; Titus 1:5)

- b) Paul is pointing out how dangerous they are: They are liars (whether they realize it or not), they are like wild animals who are useless people only concerned with themselves.
- 8) Calling out a completely evil man is easy, calling out a seemingly nice person with bad teaching is much harder. For example:
 - a) Calling out a pastor who only works 10 hours a week, is mean and is a terrible public speaker is easy.
 - b) Calling out a pastor who only works 10 hours a week and is very charismatic but doesn't fully preach Scripture is harder.
 - c) Calling out a pastor who works 50 hours a week, is very charismatic and preaches only the nice parts of Scripture out of fear of losing his job, is much much harder.
 - d) However, all are dangerous to the church, thus Paul's strong language.

<u>The Purpose - Repentance & Sound Faith - Titus 1:13b</u>

- 1) Note how the pastor/elders are to deal with heretics "reprove them severely". Titus 1:13
- A little false teaching, like leaven, will do a lot of damage.
 Matt 16:6ff; 1Cor 5:6-8; Gal 5:9
 The purpose of this correction is "that they may be sound in faith" Titus 1:13
 - a) Faith, to believe in something, or someone, clearly involves doctrine.
 - Romans 10:14 "How then will they call on Him in whom they have not believed? How will they believe in Him whom they have not heard? And how will they hear without a preacher?"
 - b) Correct (or orthodox) faith will produce correct hope, which will produce correct love.
 - c) False (heretical) faith, will produce either false hope or despair, and then will produce false love which is actually a love for evil and a hatred of what is good.
- 3) This concern about checking heresy and promoting orthodoxy is all about love/charity.
 - a) Charity for the orthodox saints that are to be protected.

 The main job of the pastor (i.e. shepherd) is to protect the sheep.

 Eph 4:11-12
 - b) All too often in the modern church we are far more concerned about being nice to unrepentant sinners while having no regard for the faithful.
 - c) We never think that repentance (to change one's mind) is an option.
 - i) Because we have so bought into the cult of hyper-individualism.
 - ii) We fear man, we fear the world, we fear the future, instead of fearing God and trusting in Him.
 - Proverbs 1:7 "The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge; Fools despise wisdom and instruction."
 - We are called to be faithful not necessarily successful.
 - iii) We put the guilt on the one speaking truth while coddling the sinner.
 - d) Also, note the purpose of this correction is also to return the heretic to "sound faith."
 - e) Ignoring the grievous sins of loved-ones is not loving.
 - f) It is not loving to them, those around them, and it is not loving and honoring to God, the great law giver and just judge.

Conclusion

- 1) In this day and age, do we err more on the side of being too tolerant or too zealous for orthodoxy?
 - a) We are clearly way too tolerant.
 - b) Much of Christianity is more terrified about being labeled a "fundamentalist" then being called "worldly."
 - c) Why?
 - i) Not out of Christianity charity but out of fear of the world.
 - ii) Remember C.S. Lewis' axiom.
- 2) Can we over do a zeal for orthodoxy and discipline and become like Pharisees?
 - a) Sure! That is always a danger and we should be vigilant against it.
 - b) What is the antidote to it, however?
 - i) Better doctrine!
 - ii) To "love your neighbor" is by definition a doctrine.
 - iii) However, every single word in that statement has to be defined by God's word not by the world!
- 3) We need to fear and love God more, knowing His Law and resting in His Gospel, for there is the correct balance.
- 4) 2Timothy 2:7-13
