

Matthews 28:18-20 Missions? (Part 1 of 2) June 30, 2024

Introduction

- 1) Question: How should this church do Missions?
 - a) As we build, hopefully by God's grace and good pleasure, this new church, it is exciting to look at everything anew.
 - b) How do we go beyond this congregation and engage the unbelieving world with the Gospel and works of charity?
 - c) Should we form a Missions Committee that meets monthly to give out money to local, national, and/or international groups that do missions (whatever that means) to the world?
 - i) Is that the best way to do things?
 - ii) Why do churches' do it that way? Is it an ancient tradition?
 - iii) Is it even biblical? What does Scripture command about missions?

- 2) Let's ponder this for the next two Sundays.
- 3) Today, let's start with the foundation: What does Scripture command?
- 4) And when it comes to missions, there is one passage that universally first comes to mind: The Great Commission.

The Great Commission

- 1) The Great Commission, from the last three verses of the Gospel of Matthew (28:18-20), is one of the most famous sections of Scripture.
- 2) And probably one of the most misheard texts in the Bible.
 - a) I think most modern evangelical Christians hear this:

"And Jesus said to <u>me</u> (the individual hearer), 'All authority has been given to <u>Me</u> (Jesus) in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and do random acts of kindness and share the Gospel with everyone, telling them how much I love them, and encourage them to invite <u>Me</u> (Jesus) into their hearts, and I will be with <u>you</u> (singular, the individual hearer) always.""

- b) That is not how the text reads or what it teaches.
- c) Remember my suggested primary rules for reading the Bible:
 - i) Read the text in its surrounding context, understanding the historical and grammatical setting to know the intent of the author.
 - ii) Unpack and define the pronouns. (I, you, he, she, it, we, you'll, them, etc.)
- 3) The text actually reads: "And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." – Matt 28:18-20

1) The Lord Jesus begins by focusing on Himself, since He is God incarnate.

- a) Matthew 16:19 "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; and whatever you bind on earth shall have been bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall have been loosed in heaven."
- b) John 20:23 "If you forgive the sins of any, their sins have been forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they have been retained."
- 6) This conquest, in the spiritual sense, begins through His Apostles, who Mark 16:15-16 are given a mission: "Go therefore and make disciples." – Matt 28:19 Acts 1:8; 14:21

The Kingdom - Going Forth (Matt 28:19-20)

- 1) Apostles are commanded to "go therefore" to "all the nations".
 - a) With the New Covenant, the faith is not just for one nation (Israel) but "all the nations."
 - b) Off on a tangent: There is a modern trend for those who want the church to engage in politics to make the "nations" in Matthew 28 refer to governments and states.

2) The Apostles are to go and "*make disciples of all the nations*" - Matthew 28:19

a) A "disciple" is someone who is a student/follower of a master.

i) It is both those concepts put together, not either/or.

- ii) It is not taking a philosophy class in college and saying, "I kind of like Plato."
- iii) It is saying, continuing with the ancient analogy, "I am a Platonist!" (Literally, "a follower of Plato.")
 - That I am committed to following, obeying and proclaiming the teachings of Plato, because his teaching is true.

Matt 10:24; Luke 6:40

Rev 5:6

- And I will move to Athens to learn from, and follow, Plato himself.
- To put it simply, you are committed to Plato.
- b) To be a disciple of Jesus Christ is to be committed to follow, obey and proclaim Christ and go live with Him.
- c) It is that, and much more, because Jesus is not a mere human philosopher.
- d) We see this is what follows!
 - i) We have to go and live with our Master. John 6:68; 12:26; Phil 1:21-23
 - ii) But where is He?
- e) These disciples need to be brought into Jesus.

ii) But how are people brought into His church?

3) "Baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit"

a)	The symbol that we are brought into Christ's	Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38;	8:16; 16:33; 22:16;

b)	Yes, this is a sign and a seal that we are His discip	les, but much more.	Rom 4:11

- i) We need to be washed because of our sins.
- ii) Baptism is the sign that we are washed because we trust in God's promises to us and our children.
- c) This is also an act of worship.
 - i) Note the clear Trinitarian language: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
 - ii) There is only one God who eternally and co-equally exists in three Persons.¹
 - iii) We are redeemed because the Father has ordained our salvation, the Son has accomplished it, and the Spirit applies it.
- d) So, the Lord Jesus is not just our Master. He is our Lord, Savior and God! And thus, He must be worshiped. Matt 8:2; 28:9; Luke 24:52; John 9:38
- c) Though baptism is very important, it is only the beginning.

4) "Teaching them to observe all that I commanded you"

- a) As disciples we have to learn what our Master wants us to know, believe in, and do..
- b) However, see how easy it is to slip into focusing on ourselves first.

- c) Question: Who is the "them" and the "you" in the "teaching them to observe all that I commanded you"?
 - i) The "them" are all the new disciples.
 - ii) The "*you*" is still the Apostles.
- d) You cannot sever the Lord Jesus from His Apostles.
 - i) You cannot say: "I follow Jesus and not Paul."
 - ii) You cannot say: "I am a red letter Christian".
 - Many modern Bibles put the words of Jesus in red.
 - This theology thinks the red letters are more important than the other black letters. Forgetting all the Bible is God breathed.

2Tim 3:16

- iii) Nor can you say, "I just follow Jesus and not any church tradition."
- e) Notice the focus in all these statements is not really on Jesus.
 - i) It is on the individual self.
 - ii) To reject the Lord Jesus' handpicked lieutenants who receive special power and authority from Him, and the church they created, is to reject the Lord Himself.
- f) Did not the Lord Jesus state: "*He who receives <u>you</u> receives Me, and he who receives Me receives Him who sent Me.*" Matthew 10:40
 - i) And that He promised "the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach <u>you</u> all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I said to you." – John 14:26
 - ii) Who is the "you"?

- g) Does not the Bible warn that those who add, or remove, from the Apostles' teaching will be damned? Rev 22:18-19
- 5) So the Great Commission is about the commission of the Apostles to create Christ's church.
 - a) Yes, the commission continues to this day until the end of the age in the organization the Apostles were commanded to create, the church.
 - b) And yes, the church is made up of individuals who are called to remain faithful and do the works of God.
 - c) However, notice the order of focus:
 - i) First, and always, Christ.
 - ii) Second, the authority of the Apostles, whose inspired teaching is found in the 27 books of the New Testament.
 - iii) Next, the church, that organization Christ creates on the foundation of the Apostles.
 - iv) Finally, individual Christians.
 - d) If you only hear #4 and #1, (me & Jesus, usually put in that order) you are not being a good disciple of the Master.
 - e) Your thinking has to be Christ focused, which means being biblical, and has to be rooted in the Apostolic (i.e. of the Apostles) church.

What is Not in the Great Commission

- 1) As we ponder missions, notice what is not in this text:
- 2) There is no reference to works of charity.
 - a) Should Christians do good works of mercy to our neighbor?
 - b) Can we mix charity with evangelism?
 - c) Yes! Lev 19:18; Matt 5:43-44; 10:42; Rom 13:8-10; Gal 6:10
 - d) However, that is never the focus of missions, let alone evangelism.(As we read here in the Great Commission and the rest of the New Testament.)
- 3) The focus is not on trying to encourage a personal conversion experiences.
 - a) The focus is not on trying to growing the church, or even trying to get people saved.
 - b) Yes, the church should desire to grow, and each new disciple has to repent, believe, and follow Christ.
 - c) The focus is making disciples.
- 4) The focus is not on individual Christians doing evangelism, or that it be turned over to para-church organizations.
 - a) Yes, individual Christians must "sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts, always being ready to make a defense to everyone who asks you to give an account for the hope that is in you, yet with gentleness and reverence." – 1Peter 3:15
 - b) Yes, Christ gives a fierce warning that those who deny Him in public, Matt 10:33 He will deny them before His Father in heaven.
 - c) Yes, para-church missionary organizations are not forbidden.
 - d) This commission, and its power, is given to the Apostles and the church Christ has founded, to bring people into individual congregations that are apostolic.
 - e) Throughout the New Testament the focus is not on individuals doing missions, but those commissioned by the church.
- 5) Though the Great Commission is very, very, important, it does not say it is the most important thing.
 - a) In the same Gospel of Matthew, the Lord Jesus told us what is the most important: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the great and foremost commandment." Matthew 22:37b-38
 - b) No doubt, part of loving God is seeing that Christ's church do the Great Commission!
 - c) However, when you study God's Law, there seems to be an Ex 20:1-17; Deut 6:4-11; order of importance of what should be done in the church: Matt 22:36-40; Eph 4:4-13
 - i) First, the correct worship of God.
 - ii) Second, discipleship of the saints.
 - iii) Outreach to the world with the Gospel and works of charity.
 - d) I am firmly convinced they must be done in that order, less you lose all three.
- 6) Does the Great Commission still apply to the church today?
 - a) Of course it does! We are to continue the Apostles' work.
 - b) We need to go out into the world and proclaim the Gospel.

- c) However, I think we (the modern) church have been doing it very differently then how the ancient church did it.
- d) I think we might have misread the Great Commission.
- e) Do we actually do missions in a biblical, apostolic, church focused sort of way?
- f) Or has individualism, pragmatism, and marketing become our foundations?
- g) Next week we will look more at the history of missions.
- h) Today, however, I we wanted to stay close to the text, so let us end where it ends.

Conclusion

- This Great Commission ends gloriously: "and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

 Matthew 28:20
- 2) The word "lo" here is from a Hebrew interjection, i.e. "a marker of exclamation".
 - a) Used to make the narrative dramatic and is very common in the Bible. Gen 1:31; Rev 22:12
 - b) To change the focus, to emphasize an idea, and/or to call attention to a detail.
 - c) Translated = Look!, Suddenly!, Now!, Here!, There!, Look! Now!, Behold!
- 3) It literally reads: "Look, I am with you all the days until the full completion of the age."
- 4) Let's ask that radical question: Who is the "*you*" in "*I am with <u>you</u> always, even to the end of the age*"?
 - a) From the context, it first has to be the Apostles.
 - b) It excludes "us"?!
 - No, of course not.
 - c) However, the promise that we will have Christ with us always is because we are His disciples, in His church, which was founded by the Apostles.
- 5) And what great assurance it does bring that what Christ promised to the Apostles has come true!
 - a) Where are the Apostles now? In heaven ruling on Twelve Thrones.
 - b) Has Christ's promise of their commission been successful?
 - c) Yes, we are living testimonies of this power!
 - i) When we look in a myopic narrow way this seems hard to see. However, when you step back and look at the big picture, it is so obvious.
 - ii) The fact that many of us are from ethnic groups the Apostles never heard of (English, Irish, Chinese, Native-American, etc.) on a continent they never knew existed some 5,600+ miles away from Jerusalem, and that 2,000 years after this Great Commission, Christianity would be the most influential ideology in world history, and there would be 2.38 billion people who live on the planet in 2024 AD who claim to be Christians, is truly a work of God's power.
- 6) If we know such a power, how can we not as a church go and make disciples of all the nations?
