Sermon Notes

Revelation 20:1-6 "Amillennialism"

A Sermon Series on Revelation 4-7
November 10, 2024

Introduction

- 1) The theme of Revelation, arguably, is that we (the church) are "More Than Conquerors" Rom 8:37 even during times of great persecution.
- 2) We are now going into Revelation, chapter 6 the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse.
- 3) This is where the debate on how to interpret Revelation really ramps up.
 - a) Everyone agrees Revelation 4-5 is about God enthroned and worshiped in heaven and that only Christ can execute God's plan by opening the sealed scroll.
 - b) When the events described in the scrolls occur, and what they mean, however, there is much debate.
 - i) Is the First Rider on the white horse Christ or the antichrist?
 - ii) Do the seals mostly focus on the:
 - Past, about the destruction of the Temple in 70 AD?
 - Future, about the Great Tribulation?
 - Or, mostly about this current present age?
- 4) In order to preach through Revelation, the preacher has to take an interpretative stance.¹
 - a) I have been arguing for an "*Idealist*" reading of Revelation.
 - i) That the events/images of Revelation usually represent the "ideal" of a thing, not a particular event or person.
 - ii) For example, I believe the second horseman, on the red horse in Rev 6:1-2, represents war which will continue throughout this age, and where the church will face persecution, as the Lord Jesus taught, until Christ's return at the end of age.

Matt 10:34; 24:6; John 15:20; 16:33; Rom 8:35; 1Cor 4:12; 2 Cor 4:9; 2Tim 3:12; James 1:2-4; 1Pet 2:19-25

iii) So, an Idealist would believe the First Horseman, on a white horse, represents Christ and His Gospel going out throughout this age.

Preterist = Revelation is about the past and especially the destruction of the Temple in 70 AD by the Romans.

Historicist = Revelation is a chronological timeline from Christ's 1st Advent (birth) to His 2nd Advent (return at the end).

Futurist = Revelation is mostly about the future end of the age.

Idealist* = Revelation is mostly about the current church age. (This is Pastor Doug's approach.)

Pastor Doug's favorite commentary on Revelation is: <u>More Than Conquerors: An Interpretation of the Book of Revelation</u> by William Hendriksen (Baker, 1940). For a good overview of the major interpretative schools see: <u>Revelation Four Views: A Parallel Commentary</u> edited by Steve Gregg (Thomas Nelson, 1997).

¹ The four major schools of interpretation of Revelation are:

- b) This means I believe Revelation is a collection of seven different visions that describe the unfolding of history, from this present age until the end of the age. With each vision repeating the timeline.²
- 5) So, in this section about the Four Horsemen, I believe the 1st Rider is the Lord Jesus going out to spiritually conquer, and the next three horsemen represent war, famine and, death which will lead to martyrs during this age, which is the millennium.
 - a) You might be now saying, "What?! You think we are in the millennium right now?!"
 - i) Or maybe some of you are saying, "What is a millennium?"
 - ii) Both are great questions!
 - b) This requires me to explain that almost all **Idealists** are also **Amillennialists**.

Amillennialism?

- 1) "Millennialism" is about the meaning of the "1,000" year reign of Christ in Revelation 20:2-7. (From the Latin word "mille" meaning "thousand".)
- 2) Amillennialists believe that we are in the millennium right now.
 - a) That we have perfect peace with God through Christ right now.
 - b) Even though the church will face persecution for this.
 - c) The "millennium" is not a literal 1,000 years but represents a long period of time between Christ's two advents.
 - i) **1**st **Advent:** Two thousand years ago where the Lord Jesus took on human flesh (Christmas), died for our sins (Good Friday), rose again from the dead (Easter), ascended into heaven (Ascension) and sent His Spirit to be with us in a special way (Pentecost).
 - ii) **2**nd **Advent**: Christ's return in power and glory in the future at the end of this age.
- 3) Amillennialists believe this age will see good and evil continually go back and forth.
 - a) Instead of history always getting better (as the post-millennialists believe).
 - b) Or that history is just getting worse (as many pre-millennialists believe).
 - c) Though most amillennialists do believe in the Great Tribulation where it will get really bad right before Christ's return at the end of this age.
- 4) Amillennialists tend to focus on Christ's 1st Advent and the implications of the cross and His heavenly reign right now, instead of focusing on His 2nd Advent (which they do believe in).
- 5) Amillennialism is one of the most ancient ways to understand the end times going back to the earliest beginnings of the church³ and has been one of the major ways to understand the end times, especially since its great defender: Augustine of Hippo (354-430 AD).
- 6) Let me show you an amillennial reading of the famous millennium text of Revelation 20:1-6, which I think is the simple plain reading of the text. (Though one can disagree.)

- 7) For (most) amillennialists, Revelation 20:1ff covers three time periods:
 - a) Revelation 20:1-3 = In the **past** about Christ's 1st Advent.
 - b) *Revelation 20:4-6* = This **present** age about Christ's church.
 - c) Revelation 20:7ff to the end of the book = The **future** about the end of this age and the eternal perfect age to come.

Revelation 20:1-3 - In the Past

- 1) John sees an "angel coming down from heaven, holding the key of the abyss and a great chain in his hand." Rev 20:1b
 - a) The angel takes hold of the dragon, which Revelation directly tells us is "the devil and Satan (the name of the devil that means 'the adversary/accuser')

Gen 3:1; 1Chr 21:1; Is 27:1; Zech 3:1-2; Job 1:6-12; 2:1-7; 3:8; 41:1; Rom 16:20; 2Cor 11:3,14; Rev 2:9; 12:9; 20:2,7

- b) The devil is thrown into the abyss⁴, which is shut and sealed, thus binding Satan "for a thousand years." Rev 20:2b
- 2) Critical Question: How long is a "thousand years", the millennium, in Revelation?
 - a) As Protestants, we correctly default to the "literal", or to use a better term "plain" reading of Scripture over an "allegorical" approach.
 - b) We are desiring the know the original meaning of the author as read in context.
 - c) However, you read apocalyptic literature (such as a Daniel, Ezekiel and Revelation) which use symbolic and figurative language, especially with regards to numbers, as symbolic and figurative.⁵
 - d) The literal way to read "1000" in Revelation 20 is that it is a symbolic number that means a long period of time.
 - i) Throughout the Bible "1000" is used to represent a generically large number.

Ex 20:6; Deut 7:9; Josh 23:10; Ps 50:10; 90:4; 91:7; Ps Ecc 6:6; Ezek 47:3ff; Hos 8:12; 1Cor 14:19; 2Pet 3:8; Rev 7:4-8; Rev 12:6; 14:1,3

- ii) As the Lord said to the rebellious northern kingdom of Israel/Ephraim: "Though I wrote for him ten thousand precepts of My law, They are regarded as a strange thing." Hosea 8:12
- 3) *Next Critical Question*: When is the 1,000 years / millennium?
 - a) The 1000 years is the time between Christ's 1^{st} advent and His 2^{nd} . These "last days" began with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. Heb 1:2; 1Pet 1:20
 - b) We see this language in 2Peter 3:3,7-9.
 - 3 Know this first of all, that in the <u>last days</u> (starting 2,000 years ago with the 1st Advent) mockers will come with their mocking, following after their own lusts (evil will continue throughout this age),

⁴ "Abyss", or the "bottomless pit", in the general sense it is the "deep" where the primordial waters come from. (Gen 1:2; 7:11; 8:2; Ps 33:7; 148:7; Ezek 26:19; Jon 2:5). Here in Revelation, it is more in the spiritual sense, a place of darkness and death. (Luke 8:31; Rom 10:7; Rev 9:1-2,11; 11:7; 17:8; 20:1,3).

For example: Do we think that Old Testament of Israel, from which the Messiah will come, is literally a woman clothed with the sun? (Rev 12:1) Or that, there are seven Holy Spirits or One? (Rev 3:1; 4:5; 5:6). Or that, the Lord Jesus is literally a Lamb with seven horns and seven eyes, or that He literally has a sword for a tongue? (Rev 1:16; 2:16; 5:6) Of course not.

Think of the modern term "millionaire" which can mean "a very rich person" though many middle-class people this day and age have a million dollars worth of wealth and very rich people are actually billionaires.

- 7 But by His word the present heavens and earth are being reserved for fire, kept for the <u>day of judgment</u> (end of the age) and destruction of ungodly men.
- 8 But do not let this one fact escape your notice, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years like one day (thousand being symbolic for a long time).
- The Lord is not slow about His promise, as some count slowness, but is patient toward <u>you</u> (the receivers of the Letter of 2Peter two thousand years ago), not wishing for <u>any</u> (all Christians throughout this age) to perish but for <u>all</u> (all the saints throughout the age) to *come to repentance* (which is only possible because Christ has come).
- c) So, we are in the millennium now, thus the name "amillennialism", "in-the millennium."
- d) What's starts and ends the millennium? Answer: Christ!
- 4) You might say: Pastor this doesn't feel like a time of perfect peace with Satan defeated?
 - a) The Bible does clearly teach that Satan is very much active in this age and demonic activity will increase during the Great Tribulation, as taught in Revelation.⁶
 - b) This is the teaching of the 4 Horsemen, that as Christ and His Gospel go forth, the works of darkness will increase too.
 - c) The imagery of the devil being bound in Revelation 20 is one of limitation, like a chained mad dog. It is dangerous but limited,
- 5) There is no doubt, however, that is great victory with Christ's first advent!
 - a) In a general sense God has always restricted the fallen angels. Job 1:12; 2Pet 2:4; Jude 6
 - b) Jesus has power over the devil.
 - c) Jesus gave power to His disciples to cast out Matt 12:28-29; Mark 3:24-27 demons showing that the Kingdom has come. Luke 10:17-20; 11:20-22
 - d) The New Testament clearly teaches that with Christ's 1st Advent the devil is defeated, restrained and bound.

Dan 7:13-14; Luke 10:17-20; John 12:31-33; Rom 8:37-39; 14:9; 16:20; Eph 1:20-22; Phil 2:9-11; Col 2:10-15; 2Thes 2:6-12; Heb 2:14; 1Pet 3:22; Rev 12:5-17

Matt 4:1-11; Luke 4:1-13; 10:18ff

- 6) To give an example: Hebrews 2:14-15 "Therefore, since the children share in flesh and blood, He Himself likewise also partook of the same (Christmas - 1st Advent), that through death (Good Friday - 1st Advent) *He might render* (an agrist active subjunctive verb – meaning a completed action in the past that has ongoing implications) powerless him who had the power of death, that is, the devil, and might free those who through fear of death were subject to slavery all their lives."
- 7) Revelation 20 directly tells us the outcome of this binding!
 - a) Revelation 20:3a- "and he threw him into the abyss, and shut it and sealed it over him, so that he would not deceive the nations any longer . . . "
 - b) Before Christ's 1st Advent how many nations received God's Word? Answer: One - Old Testament Israel.
 - c) After Christ's 1st Advent how many nations receive the Gospel?
 - i) Answer: All of them.

6:11,16; 1Thes 2:18; 2Thes 2:9; 1Tim 1:20; 3:5,7; 5:15; 2Tim 2:26; James 4:7; 1Pet 5:8-9; 1John 3:8,10; Rev 12:5-17; 17:8.

- ii) Matthew 28:18b-20 "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth (this starts with His 1st Advent!). Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."
- iii) Question: Did the Lord Jesus fail at this promise?
- iv) No! We of all nations who live thousands of miles away from Jerusalem are a testimony about this!

Gal 3:8

v) The millennium will end when the Gospel is preached to all the nations and all those God has ordained to be His.

Matt 24:14; Mark 13:10 2Pet 3:8-9

d) Satan has been bound, he can no longer deceive the nations thus the Gospel is going forth conquering sinners of all nations, just as the Bible teaches.

Ps 2:7,8; 72:8-11,17 Matt 11:27; 28:16-20; Luke 24:47

Acts 1:8; 14:16-21; 2Cor 4:3-6

- 8) It is true, at the end of this age, during the Great Tribulation, Satan will be released for a short period of time.
 - a) As Revelation 20:3b teaches "... until the thousand years were completed; after these things he must be released for a short time."
 - b) The following verses, however, focus on the blessings we saints have right now, throughout the millennium.

Revelation 20:4-6 - In the Present

John sees thrones in heaven and sitting on them are the saints
 who have died in this age and are now in glory in heaven
 (i.e. the church triumphant) reigning with Christ, worshiping
 God and awaiting the final resurrection at the end of the age.

Matt 19:28; Luke 22:29; Rom 5:17; Rom 8:17;1Cor 6:2-3; 15:25; 2Tim 2:11-13; 4:8; Rev 1:6; 3:21-22; 4:2-11; 5:10; 6:9-11

- a) Judgment has been given the them.
- b) Because the world will be judged by the saints.

Dan 7:22; 1Cor 6:2

- 2) Revelation then puts a special focus on those who have been martyred for the faith.
 - a) Remember, Revelation's original audience was the tiny persecuted new church.
 - b) All the saints are included those who have true abiding faith and have not follow after the prince of this world (Satan, the beast).
 - c) Revelation 20:4a "Then I saw thrones, and they sat on them, and judgment was given to them. And I saw the souls of those who had been beheaded (the martyred) because of their testimony of Jesus and because of the word of God, and those (those who remained faithful all true Christians) who had not worshiped the beast or his image, and had not received the mark on their forehead and on their hand..."
- 3) You are probably asking:

Rev 13:16-17; 14:9-11; 16:2; 19:20

What is the "mark of the beast"?

a) The mark is not a visible outward sign, but those who reject God and belong to the devil.

Matt 13:38; John 8:38-44; Acts 13:10

b) Acts 13:9-10 – "But Saul, who was also known as Paul, filled with the Holy Spirit, fixed his gaze on him (Elymas the magician), and said, 'You who are full of all deceit and fraud, you son of the devil, you enemy of all righteousness, will you not cease to make crooked the straight ways of the Lord?"

- c) To have the "mark of the beast" is to be spiritually dead, a child of Satan, and an enemy of God.
- Eph 2:1-3

d) Satan's image is all the things of this world and the flesh.

Gal 5:19-21

- e) By the way, there is no middle neutral group: You are either in Christ or in darkness.
- 4) What happens to the faithful who die in Christ?
 - a) Revelation 20:4b "and they came to life and reigned with Christ for a thousand years."
 - b) So, for the Christian who dies in this life goes to heaven and will reign with Christ until the end of this age.
 - c) This is not the resurrection at the end of the age.

Rev 20:7ff

- d) This is going to heaven spiritually, to be with the Lord, upon our death.
- e) Where we will be with God, and worship Him with the saints and the angels, as we reign on thrones.
- 5) What about those who are not in Christ?
 - a) Revelation 20:5 "The rest of the dead did not come to life until the thousand years were completed. This is the first resurrection."
 - b) The first resurrection is when we are made alive in Christ.

John 5:24; 11:25; Rom 6:4-5,13 Eph 2:5-6; Col 2:13; 3:1; Rev 14:13

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- c) The wicked do not have this new life, though everyone (the elect and the reprobate) will receive a new body at the end of the age when everyone is resurrected and stands before God for judgment.
- d) We see this in the next verse: Revelation 20:6a "Blessed and holy is the one who has a part in the first resurrection (put in Christ because of His resurrection); over these the second death (i.e. going to hell) has no power..."
- e) The second death when the wicked are cast into hell forever after everyone is resurrected and judged by God at the end of the age.

 Though Christians in this age will taste death (unless Christ returns) the threat of the second death (going to hell) has no power.

Dan 12:2; Matt 25:46; John 5:29; Acts 24:15;

1Thes 1:10;

Rev 2:11; 20:14; 21:8

- 6) What is heaven like right now?
 - a) Revelation 20:6 "but they will be priests of God and of Christ and will reign with Him for a thousand years."
 - b) Note again: God (the Father) and Christ are different yet there is only one God!
 - c) All Christians are priests and we will offer perfect sacrifices to God in heaven and reign with Christ until the end of the age!

Conclusion

- 1) You doubt we are in the millennium now?

 (And/or have a different take on the millennium That is okay!)
- 2) However, let me ask you:

Has not Christ already triumphed over death?

Is not His death perfect and sufficient to cover all sins?

Is not Christ, right now, reigning and ruling in heaven?

Interceding with the Father for His followers.

Sending His Spirit to guide and protect His people?

And right, now putting His enemies under His feet?

Do you not have perfect peace with God right now?

Does not Christ's sacrifice on the cross rightfully atone for all your sins?

Are you not fully justified, adopted and declared holy right now because of Christ?

Do you not receive all these blessings, right now, by faith alone?

3) We have victory with Christ right now!
