Sermon Notes

1Samuel 2:4-9 "The LORD's Doing"

A Sermon Series on 1Samuel 1-8

May 25, 2025

Introduction

- 1) We say that God is Lord, King, sovereign, in control, etc., do we believe it?
 - a) Like so many things of the faith it is easy, yet for us saints in the fallen world hard to fully do it based on trusting the Almighty, lest by God's grace.
 - b) As seen by that great prayer of the father of the demon possessed boy in Mark 9:24b "I do believe; help my unbelief."
- 2) We are working through one of the great prayers, psalms, in the Bible: Hannah's rejoicing of having asked for, and received, a child, and then turning him over to the Lord to be His, as priest in the Lord's house in Shiloh.
- 3) We read last week how Hannah began her prayer by exulting in the Lord (v.1-2) and then gives a warning to the listeners not to be arrogant because God will judge. (v.3)
- 4) Let's continue to hear Hannah's rejoicing as she is greatly moved by the Holy Spirit.

1Samuel 2:4-5 - Contrasts

- 1) 1Samuel 2:4-5 begins with stark unexpected contrasts.
 - a) The weapons of the powerful are broken but the weak & defeated are armed with strength and power.

b) Those who are well fed have to get a job to earn food
but the starving will no longer ever be hungry.

1Sam 2:5a

 The woman who has no children will have many and she who has many children will wither and pine away.

1Sam 2:5b

1Sam 2:4

- i) This one of course, Hannah knows very well, having had no child and then blessed to have Samuel, who she joyfully dedicates to the Lord.
- ii) Remember, children are a blessing from God.

iii) The word "seven" in the Bible means both literally the "number seven" and also is used figuratively for perfection.

Gen 2:1-3; Ps 12:6; Prov 18:21-22 Ruth 4:15; Jer 15:9; Matt 18:21-22 Rev 1:4; 4:5; 5:1; 8:2; 13:1; 16:1

Gen 1:28; 33:5; Ps 127:3-5; 128:3-4

Prov 17:6; Is 54:13; John 16:21

iv) And the Lord will give Hannah several other children.

1Sam 2:21

- 2) A brief tangent: Note the parallelism ("mighty feeble", "shattered strength", "full hungry", etc.) this "A then B" pattern is found throughout Old Testament (OT) and is a fundamental quality of Hebrew poetry.
- 3) These verses are teaching a few things:
 - a) There will be blessings and judgments.

Deut 28:1-2,15; Ps 75:7; Matt 25:1ff; Rom 2:6-8

b) How the world perceives things is not reality.

Prov 14:12; Rom 12:2; 1Cor 1:18-25

- c) What seems impossible is not for God.
- d) As God famously said, "'For My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways My ways,' declares the LORD. 'For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways and My thoughts than your thoughts." Isaiah 55:8-9
- e) Or as the Lord Jesus taught, "And the disciples were amazed at His words. But Jesus answered again and said to them, 'Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' And they were even more astonished and said to Him, 'Then who can be saved?' Looking upon them, Jesus said, 'With men it is impossible, but not with God; for all things are possible with God.'" Mark 10:24-27
- f) God will turn losers into winners and winners into losers.
- 4) With the blessing of hindsight, the author of Hebrews writes: "And what more shall I say? For time will fail me if I tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel (Hannah's son) and the prophets, who by faith conquered kingdoms, performed acts of righteousness, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched the power of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, from weakness were made strong, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight."

 Hebrews 11:32-34

1Samuel 2:6 - God is Sovereign Even Over Life & Death

- 1) Hannah then brings our attention to He who does these things, by using the most extreme example: The LORD "kills and makes alive." 1Samuel 2:6a
 - a) God ordains all things, including life and death.

Gen 2:7; Job 12:10; 2Kgs 5:7; Job 12:10; Ps 36:9; Ps 139:13-16; Eccles 12:6-7; Is 44:24; Jer 1:5; John 1:3-4

- b) Deuteronomy 32:39 "See now that I, I am He, and there is no god besides Me; It is I who put to death and give life. I have wounded and it is I who heal, and there is no one who can deliver from My hand."
- c) By our worldly thinking we would think life should be first and then death.
 - i) From our perspective that seems like the logical order: From birth date to death date.
 - ii) Because from a worldly perspective killing is easy, giving life is impossible, especially new life and, in particular, resurrection new life and a new body.

(Remember our Lord's word from above in Mark 10:24-27.)

- 2) Hannah emphasizes the radical nature of this with the next line: "*He brings down to Sheol and raises up.*" 1Samuel 2:6b
 - a) Sheol means the "the grave", "the pit", the "realm of death."

Gen 37:35; 2Sam 22:6 Is 7:11; Amos 9:2

b) There are verses in the OT that seem to teach there is no life after death.

Job 7:9; Ps 6:5; 30:9; 88:10-12 Ps 115:17; Eccl 9:5,10; Is 38:18-19

- i) For example, Psalm 30:9-10 "What profit is there in my blood, if I go down to the pit? Will the dust praise You? Will it declare Your faithfulness? Hear, O LORD, and be gracious to me; O LORD, be my helper."
- ii) That is why the Sadducees (an ancient Jewish religious-political sect) believed there was no resurrection.

Matt 22:23-32 Mark 12:18-27

Luke 20:27-38; Acts 23:6-8

- iii) These references are poetic in nature with men turning over their fear of the unnatural nature of death.
 - Psalm 30 is not teaching there is no heaven or resurrection.
 - It is a prayer to avoid death while asking for mercy.
- c) Though the NT is very clear there is life after death, so too is the OT.

Gen 5:24; Ex 3:6; 1Sam 2:6 Job 19:25-26; Ps 16:10-11; 49:15 Ps 73:24-26; Is 26:19; Dan 12:2-3

- d) This is not just life after death but resurrection: New eternal life with a new perfect body.
- e) As Job, who is one of the oldest characters in the Bible boldly states: "As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last He will take His stand on the earth. Even after my skin is destroyed, yet from my flesh I shall see God" Job 19:25-26
- f) Hence, Hannah's "and raises up", she prophetically proclaims God will bring the dead back to life.

1Samuel 2:7-8 - God's Sovereignty in This Life

- 1) If God controls death and life, and even resurrects the dead, then He can make the poor rich, and the humble/needy/defeated/those of low status, be exalted.
 - a) God raises the poor up from the dust, the needy from the ash heap.

1Sam 2:8a Zech 9:3-4

b) God will cause the lowly to sit with nobles and inherit a seat of honor.

1Sam 2:8b

- c) As the Psalmist writes in Psalm 113, seemingly directly inspired by Hannah's prayer: "He raises the poor from the dust and lifts the needy from the ash heap, to make them sit with princes, with the princes of His people. He makes the barren woman abide in the house as a joyful mother of children. Praise the LORD!" Psalm 113:7-9
- 2) God will do extraordinary things in this age, not just in the next.
- 3) Why? How?
 - a) Because He is the Creator of All things!
 - b) 1Samuel 2:8b "For the pillars of the earth are the LORD's, and He set the world on them."
 - c) God has created the foundations of all things, including the physical laws that govern creation.

2Sam 22:8,16; Job 9:6; 38:4-6 Ps 18:15; 75:3; 104:5; Prov 8:29; 30:4

- 4) God's sovereign plan is being worked out in this life.
 - a) Whether it is something miraculous by God's dramatic power, such as Samuel calling down thunder and rain in 1Samuel 12:16-17
 - b) Or something that seems ordinary to us, like when Hannah became pregnant.
 - i) 1Samuel 1:19b "And Elkanah had relations with Hannah his wife, and the LORD remembered her."

ii) God also works through ordinary, or secondary, means.¹

iii) Because all things have been ordained and decreed by Him. Gen 8:22; Ex 21:13; Deut 19:5 1Kgs 22:28,34; Is 10:6-7; Jer 31:35

Ps 135:6; Prov 16:9,33; Is 46:9-10; 45:7

Dan 4:35; Acts 4:27-28

Rom 8:28; 9:15,18; 11:33; Eph 1:11; Heb 6:17

- 5) God acts contrary to how the world thinks.
 - a) The world focuses on selfishness, pride, violence and success.
 - b) The church focuses on faith, hope and love in Christ.

1Cor 13

- 6) You see this throughout the Old Testament Church.
 - a) When God's people were gathered into the nation-state of Israel.
 - b) Israel fought many wars but throughout the Scripture it is taught and shown that God brings the victory.²
 - c) When Israel trusted in themselves they failed. When they trusted in God they succeeded, as we will see later in 1Samuel.

Num 14:40-42; Judg 1:19 1Sam 4:3,10-11; 13:11-13 2Ch 16:7-9

- 7) In our earthly way of thinking we tend to focus on our self and the immediate.
 - a) And this is sometimes understandable and not always wrong.
 - i) The faithful Hannah was grieved she had no child and prayed and vowed to the Lord for one.

1Sam 1:2,6-7,10-11

ii) The Lord Jesus, He who is God, and without sin, prayed, deeply grieved in Gethsemane before the cross.

Matt 26:36ff Mark 14:32ff

- b) You might say to me: "But Hannah had her prayer answered, so it was easy for her."
 - i) I would guess, that if you added up all your prayers throughout your life you would be amazed how many the Lord has answered.

(Though we tend to forget about that and focus on the negative.)

- ii) And praise God, He doesn't answer all our prayers, because even our most godly prayers for a desired outcome could actually be contrary to our good and His glory.
 - What if God the Father answered Jesus's prayer to avoid the cross?
 - His request was godly, even though He knew the cross was His purpose.
 - But how did He end that prayer? "Yet not what I will, but what You will." Mark 14:36
- iii) And look at Hannah, she received a child (Samuel) and then had to give him over to the Lord at around the age of three, yet she does it joyfully.
 - How did she do this? By God's grace she comprehended the big picture.
 - When you step back, and look at what God is doing to, and for, His people it is amazing.

- iv) Hannah's child, Samuel, is not only will be a priest, he is considered the first of the great prophets to come after Moses, and being the last Judge he will anoint the first king of Israel, and from King David's line will come the King of Kings.
- 8) The focus on the church is key.
 - a) One of the reasons Hannah could have such joy is because her focus was on Christ (see verse 10!) and the church, over the blessings of a family.
 - b) Family is a great blessing.
 - c) But we have to rightly order our loves, as Hannah did.

1Samuel 2:9 - Conclusion

- 1) Look at the final verse of our sermon text: "He keeps the feet of His godly ones, but the wicked ones are silenced in darkness; For not by might shall a man prevail." 1Samuel 2:9
 - a) God promises that His godly ones will be kept by Him, that His people's feet will not slip.

Ps 91:11, 12; 121:3 Prov 3:26; 1Pet 1:5

b) The wicked will be silenced. They dwell in darkness in this life and fully in the fire and darkness in the next.

Matt 6:23; 8:12 Matt 22:13; 25:30

- c) It is not by the might of man that anything will endure.
- d) Look at all the great empires that have come against God's people: Egypt, Assyria, Babylon, Greece, Roman, etc. They all have failed and are now gone.
- 2) We respond in faith. But what does that mean?
 - a) First and foremost, we trust and rest in Christ and His Gospel.
 - i) That our sins are forgiven and we are His.
 - ii) Ephesians 2:8-10 "For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them."
 - b) We trust in a good outcome, whatever it might be in this life.
 - i) We believe in 1Samuel 2:9
 - ii) Knowing God is working out His plan.
 - iii) We are called to be faithful not necessarily successful.
 - iv) Being faithful and having it not work out in this life is not sin but faithfulness.
 - Better a church be faithful and shut down rather than it grows in influence worldly and becomes a synagogue of Satan.

• The smallest churches in Revelation 2-3 (Smyrna & Philadelphia) were among the most faithful.

Rev 2:8-11 Rev 3:7-13

v) There are times when there is a drought of the Word of God in a particular land, in which case our calling, as always, is to be faithful not necessarily successful.

1Sam 3:1; 28:5-6 Amos 8:11-12; Matt 13:13,58 Acts 13:44-46; 16:6-7

• Such is the time Hannah lived in.

• We are reading her great prayer in 1Samuel 2:1-10

- But look at the very next chapter: "Now the boy Samuel (Hannah's son) was ministering to the LORD before Eli. And word from the LORD was rare in those days, visions were infrequent." 1Samuel 3:1
- Or the fact that the godly Samuel's children (Hannah's grandchildren) 1Sam 8:1-3 did not follow in Samuel's, or Hannah's, godly ways.
- vi) Even with these conditions Hannah rejoiced in the Lord, knowing that His people will be protected, and thus she remained faithful.
- c) We remain faithful to God's Word
 - i) We have to do things the right way, prioritizing what God does and putting secondary what God puts secondary.
 - ii) This is very hard for modern American Christians.
 - iii) We think as long as we can quote John 3:16 then we can engage in any and all sorts of pragmatic schemes to be successful.
 - iv) This requires a strong knowledge of God and His Word and wisdom to correctly understand and apply it.

2Tim 2:15 2Pet 3:14-16

- 3) Should we, the church, just sit around and wait for God to do things or work hard for His Kingdom?
 - a) Of course we should work hard. However, notice the very human centric, pragmatic, nature of the sentence above.
 - b) Hannah did a lot of work: She obeyed and respected her husband and the church, she was diligent in worship both going to Shiloh and fulfilling her OT vow, she willingly put the church first by giving away her son unto the service of the Lord, and she prayed.
 - The work in the church we need to do is what the Lord commands us to do, and the first thing He commands us to do is worship.

Ex 20:1ff

- i) Yes, there are other things to be done (discipleship, charity to members, proclaiming the Gospel to the world, etc.)
- ii) However, do we have the correct focus on what God wants us to focus on?
- d) Hannah learned that in the battles of life, especially in the church, it is not strength or human wisdom that brings victory.

Ps 33:16-17 Jer 9:23

c) Because God gives the victory.

Rom 8:37; 1Cor 15:56-57; Heb 2:14f; 1John 5:4; Rev 21:4

- 4) Remember John's reaction when he sees Christ in a vision and our Lord's declaration: "When I (John) saw Him, I fell at His feet like a dead man. And He placed His right hand on me, saying, 'Do not be afraid; I am the first and the last, and the living One; and I bwas dead, and behold, I am alive forevermore, and I have the keys of death and of Hades (Greek version of Sheol)."

 Revelation 1:17-18
- 5) Thus David can pray: "For You will not abandon my soul to Sheol; Nor will You allow Your Holy One to undergo decay. You will make known to me the path of life; In Your presence is fullness of joy; In Your right hand there are pleasures forever."
